BY-LAWS

SUSTAINABILITY ADVISORY BOARD

§ 52.345 ESTABLISHMENT.

There is hereby established an advisory board to be known as the "Sustainability Advisory Board," hereinafter referred to as the "Board."

§ 52.346 PURPOSE AND INTENT.

The purpose and intent of the Board shall be to advise and assist the City Council, City Manager, and city staff (hereafter collectively the "city") in matters relating to pollution reduction, water quality initiatives, community education and involvement, and assessing local climate risk.

§ 52.347 COMPOSITION; TERMS; VACANCIES.

(A) The Board shall consist of seven (7) members appointed by the City Council.

(B) Appointment. One (1) appointment by each councilmember, and (2) at-large appointments by a majority of Council. The members shall be selected by using the City Council's process for filling board positions.

(C) Terms and term limits. The initial term, and subsequent terms for the two (2) atlarge members shall be four (4) years. The remaining five (5) members shall serve staggered terms coinciding with the term of the councilmember who made the appointment. The initial term shall begin February 1, 2018. The members appointed by Councilmembers in Seats 1, 2 and 3 shall serve until November 2020 when the Mayor and Councilmembers' seats come up for re-election; members appointed by Councilmembers in Seats 4 and 5 shall serve until November 2018 when the Councilmembers' seats come up for re-election. Thereafter, all subsequent terms shall convene with the appointing Councilmember's term of election.

(D) Residential requirements. Members must be a resident of or a business owner within the City of Palm Bay for at least one (1) year. Members must remain a City of Palm Bay resident or business owner throughout the term of his/her appointment.

§ 52.348 DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES.

(A) The Board shall identify and make recommendations to the City Council concerning affordable strategies associated with conservation, renewable energy, and energy efficiency. Duties of the Board shall include:

(1) Develop an environmental sustainability plan for city operations with a goal of achieving one hundred percent (100%) clean energy by 2035 in city operations.

(2) Develop an assessment plan to track activities and implementation of the city's environmental sustainability plan. Provide an annual report to the City Council on activities and implementation of the plan.

(3) Review ordinances and policies that have an environmental impact on the city and make recommendations to City Council. Such topics may include standards for recycling, environmental standards, preservation and landscape design, and floodplain management.

(B) Initiatives of the Board may include:

(1) Research, identify, and recommend to the public affordable strategies associated with conservation, renewable energy, and energy efficiency.

(2) Research and recommend to the public financial initiatives and resources that are available to offset costs associated with renewable energy initiatives.

(3) Recognize the efforts of others who contribute to the beautification, environmental protection, and enhancement of the city.

(C) The Board shall perform such additional duties and services as may from time to time be assigned by the City Council.

§ 52.349 RULES OF PROCEDURE.

(A) Meetings shall be held on such days and at such times and locations as the Board from time to time determines. Meetings shall be held in public facilities.

(B) Quorum. Four (4) members of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting and the vote of a majority of such quorum shall be sufficient for formal action by the Board.

(C) Officers. The Board shall select its own chairperson and vice chairperson and such other officers as it deems appropriate. The officers shall serve for a term of one (1) year and may succeed themselves.

(D) By-laws. The Board may prepare and adopt such by-laws, rules, and regulations for its own guidance as it may deem expedient and not inconsistent with law.

(E) Absences. Members who fail to attend three (3) consecutive regular meetings or a total of five (5) meetings of any type within a twelve (12) month period, shall automatically forfeit their appointments. The chairperson shall notify the Office of the City Clerk of any vacancy, at which time the process to fill the vacancy shall be implemented.

(F) Agendas and minutes. The Board shall submit to the City Council, within an appropriate time frame, an agenda of the upcoming meeting and the minutes of the previous meeting. The Board shall submit other reports from time to time as directed by the City Council.

§ 52.350 COMPENSATION.

Members shall serve without compensation.

RE: Authorize Vice Chair Snyder to address the Palm Bay Municipal Foundation regarding the creation of a Sustainability Fund

SUMMARY:

During previous Sustainability Board Meetings, the Board expressed the desire to host a sustainability-based event. The Board agreed to focus efforts on establishing an annual Sustainability Fair. At the July 27, 2022 regular meeting, the Board elected to appoint Vice Chair Philip Snyder to serve on the Sustainability Fair Task Force. As part of the discussion amongst the Board at the regular meeting on August 24, 2022 regarding the proposed Sustainability Fair, the Board discussed the possibility of using the Fair to raise funds for the Board to host an annual Sustainability Fair as well as carrying out certain activities in accordance with the adopted Sustainability Action Plan.

The Palm Bay Municipal Foundation, Inc. is the 501(c)3 of the City of Palm Bay which serves as a charitable, educational, and cultural purposes. Similarly, the Foundation previously established funds for the Disaster Relief Committee and the Mayor's Ball with the intent to provide charitable donations for relief following natural disaster as well as to off-set the costs for the event, respectively.

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Vice Chair Snyder to address the Palm Bay Municipal Foundation to request the creation of a Sustainability Fund.

1. Rebecca Ziegler and Jane Higgins – Florida Native Plant Society

Ms. Higgins led a very informative talk based upon a discussion presented by Dr. Doug Tellamy about native plants and their importance for our ecosystem. The basis was that every neighborhood needed to have more native plants. Utilizing native plants in turn helped insects and animals thrive versus many ornamental plant variations that were typically chosen for landscaping.

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Ms. Higgins answered questions from the board about the organization and what native plants were used or seen in Palm Bay.

2. Natalie Shaber, Engineer III, Public Works Department – Voluntary Low Impact Development

Ms. Shaber presented an introduction and an overall summary of the City of Palm Bay's Low Impact Development Manual draft. The discussion was presented to the board to increase their understanding and awareness of what the City had been doing to increase sustainable development.

Ms. Shaber concluded her presentation with an invitation to the board to review the draft LID incentive matrix created for developers that chose to adopt LID standards. If there were any questions or ideas for the matrix, Ms. Shaber would gladly consider them.
